offer the following outline as a possible adaption for use in the SCA.

- 1. The King and Queen summon the Order of the Laurel.
- 2. The Order enters from the back of the hall two-by-two, perhaps carrying symbols of their respective arts.
- 3. A representative of the order announces that in keeping with tradition, after due thought and examination, they wish to name one as worthy to join their ranks.
- 4. Their majesties agree, and summon the candidate.
- 5. The candidate enters, perhaps escorted by a sponsor and/or with examples of his/her art displayed in procession. He/she kneels before Their Majesties.
- 6. The Queen (patroness of the arts and sciences in Atlantia) drapes her cloak around the shoulders of the candidate. She instructs him/her that this is a symbol of the countenance conveyed by the Crown and bids him/her remember the weight of the responsibilities of a peer, especially in upholding the arts and sciences, even as he/she feels the weight of the cloak. the cloak is then removed.
- 7. The King then askss for a token of the Order. The sponsor or another appropriate person presents a medallion or wreath. The King explains the Laurel is a symbol, our connection with both the classical and medieval past and our triumph over ignorance through diligent study and effort, as well as being the symbol of our society. The token is then placed on the candidate and he/she is instructed in accepting the token to be mindful to always maintain their struggle against ignorance and conduct themselves in a manner worthy of a peer.
- 8. The scroll is then read and the candidate swears fealty, if he/she chooses.
- 9. The King and Queen dismiss the order to celebrate the elevation of a new member. The order exits, again two-by-two, escorting the new laurel from court. They greet him/her at the back of the hall. The populace cheers and the children wave colorful banners.

Mot Enough Saxon Violence October 26,27, 1996

The year is 948. The place is Viking Kingdom of York, Northumberland, England. The Anglo Saxon Chronicle records that:

This year king Edred overran all Northumberland; because they had taken Eric for their king; and in the persuit of plunder was that large minster at Rippon set on fire, which St. Wilferth built. As the king returned homeward, he overtook the enemy at York; but his main army was behind at Chesterford. There was great slaughter made; and the king was so wroth, that he would fain return with his force, and lay waste the land withal; but when the council of the Northumberians understood that, they then abandoned Eric, and compromised the deed with king Edred.

The Barony of Storvik invites you to come and join us in a recreation of Edred's campaign against Eric Bloodaxe. On October 26, 1996, at Patuxtant River Park (Croom), one of the battles of Edred and Eric will be fought. On one side, Norse and Danes. On the other, the English and Danes. Weapons and shield forms are limited to those known in 10th century England, Ireland, and Scandanavia (i.e., round or kite shields, and single-handed swords or axes, spears, Viking two-handed [long] axes. No great swords, two swords or pole-arms other than spear or Viking long axe). Non combatants may watch the battles, or participate in the recreation as a Camp Follower or Refugee.

Following the battles, there will be a feast, drawn from A Handbook of Anglo-Saxon Food & Drink, prepared by the Camp Followers in period fashion. Weather permitting, the feast will be eaten around the fire. The meadhorn will be passed, and each warrior encouraged to boast his tale of battle. The following day, Sunday October 27, a Kingdom War Practice will be held.

The site will open Friday Evening, October 25th, for early arrivals. Onboard space at the feast is limited to 75 people; offboard space is unlimited. We have reserved camping space for at least 100 persons. The fee structure and directions will be posted in the September Acorn. A Period Laurel Ceremony by Deirdre O'Siodhachain

"There are, of course, ambitions that are wholly selfish, but no one would contend that the poet's desire for fame is necessarily of this nature. The laurel is a world-old symbol of victory, and, while it was awarded to kings and conquerors, it was no small thing that the conquerors of the kingdom of the soul should have been distinguished in like manner, it is the art, not the man, that is crowned, and in that lies the real triumph" - Jerrold Francesco Petrarca, p. 64

Of the three Peerage orders in the SCA, only that of knighthood is generally initiate and confirm a candidate into its peerage, the brotherhood of chivalry.

While I fear I have never found a model on which the Order of the Pelican might base their rite of passage, there are in fact a few isolated instances in period of a notable person being publicly honored by bestowing a laurel wreath to mark distinguished scholarship and excellence in the art of poetry.

The most famous of these ceremonies occurred on Easter Day, April 8, 1341. The recipient was the Italian poet and scholar, Francesco Petrarca, better known to English speakers as Petrarch.

Petrarch was one of the foremost scholars of his day, as well as poet of great renown. By his early thirties he had established an international reputation as an innovative poet and as a classical scholar in both Latin and Greek. He was among the first of the humanists, possibly the best educated man of his time, and certainly one of the major figures of the Italian Renaissance.

Having established himself as the correspondent and confidant of many influential men as well as being generally acknowledged the foremost scholar of his time, Petrarch felt a need for some more concrete recognition than mere reputation, It is not clear whether Petrarch or one of his friends first came up with the suggestion for a public coronation with the laurel as was done for a few other poets in the 1310's, but the poet certainly approved the notion and let it be known discreetly that he would favorably entertain a invitation from a suitable source.

Apparently when word got out more than one place wished the honor of bestowing the laurel wreth. Petrarch received invitations from both the University of Paris and Senate of Rome on the same day. (September 1, 1340) at his isolated residence at Vaucluse outside Avignon in France. He decided, not surprisingly for an Italian and classicist, in favor of the Roman invitation.

To lend legitimacy to the process, Petrarch first went to the court of King

Robert the Wise of Naples who was justly famed for his learning and patronage of the arts for an "examination" to determine the poet's worthiness. Petrarch sailed in February 1341 from Marseilles to Naples and arrived in late in the month. During March, he and King Robert spent three days in public discussion and dissertations. At the end, Robert pronounced the poet worthy and offered to present the laurel wreath himself. Petrarch declined on the basis of his prior commitment to the Senate in Rome and desire to receive the laurel in the city of the great poets of classical Rome.

King Robert acquiesced to this preference and only regretted his age prevented him going with the poet to Rome. However, Robert gave Petrarch his own royal purple robe of honor to wear at the ceremony as a mark of sponsorship.

The coronation of Petrarch as Poet Laureate took place within days of his arrival in Rome. The ceremony was held in the Senatorial Palace on the Capitaline hill. It began with a procession of twelve 15-year-old boys (the sons of gentlemen and citizens) dressed in scarlet and followed by six noble gentlemen dressed in green, each carrying a garland of flowers. The Roman Senator Orso then entered wearing the laurel wreath and took his place on a throne. Petrarch was summoned with trumpets and fifes and presented himself to the Senator, crying out three times for the long life and liberty of the Romans and their Senators. He then knelt and the Senator said "The crown is the reward of merit," and placed the wreath upon Petrarch's head. Petrarch recited a sonnet (now lost) on the valor of ancient Rome to mark the occassion. It was followed by an oration. The giving of the laurel was then confirmed by the reading of a declaration of eight points, chief among them confirming Petrarch a master of the arts and history and a citizen of Rome. Petrarch was then acclaimed by the crowd.

It is interesting to note the entirely secular nature of the ceremony as opposed to the deeply religious associations of the knighting ceremony of the time. However, after the laurel coronation was over, Petrarch retired to St. Peter's where he left the wreath as a devotional offering on the alter.

Petrarch was initially very proud of receiving the laurel to public acclaim, although he later came to regret it. In later years he would be the subject of much criticism for it and he grew to feel it had aroused only jealousy and condemnation of his vanity and pride. Nonethelass, it was done in a spirit linking the great poets of ancient Rome to those were their students and successors in a different age.

Based on what is known of the crowning of Petrarch with the laurel wreath, I


