FROM CENTRAL ALEXANDRIA: Make your way to Va. Route 7 (King St.) heading west (toward I-395 & Baily's Crossroads). The second light after Quaker Lane is Wakefield St.; turn right. Follow FROM WAKEFIELD, below. (If you reach I-395, you have gone too far; turn around & follow FROM ANYWHERE ELSE, below.)

FROM ANYWHERE ELSE: Make your way to the intersection of I-395 & Va. Route 7 (in Fairfax, Rte 7 is "Leesburg Pike;" in Alexandria & on the I-395 exit sign, it's "King St."). Ye and Thee: A Research Note

While doing some research on the Child Ballads, it occurred to me that I was making an error in interpreting the word 'ye' as 'you'. I was assuming that ye was a dialect form of you because much of the material Prof. Child collected was printed using phonetic spellings to represent Scots and English dialects. Then I noticed that almost all forms of address in the ballads use the intimate 'thee' and 'thou' instead of the modern, impersonal 'you'. My intuition led me to Webster's dictionary which confirmed my hunch. Early printers used the character 'y' instead of the character thorn 'þ' to represent the 'th' sound. My original error occurred because I have heard the word 'ye' sung in various folksongs. While this may be accurate for using more recent spoken dialect, it may well be an error when reading older source documents. Judgements on whether 'thee' or 'you' should be read can be difficult, but the best indicator is the context of who is being addressed. Friends, family, and well-known enemies are generally accorded the intimate form.

I take this as another lesson that we cannot be too careful in our research. It is all too easy to allow assumptions to subtly alter otherwise accurate pieces of scholarship. We are all aware of the problems in speaking forsoothly; we should also apply this knowledge to our reading and writing.

NOTES FROM THE BARONY MEETING

The December Barony meeting was held December 11th, at the home of Lord Andrew MacGregor, Mistress Meghan Pengwyn and Lady Winifred Corber de Winterwood in Falls Church.

OFFICERS' REPORTS: The HERALD reported that he had nothing to report. He has not received any submissions. The MARSHAL reported that nothing new was going on. The Sunday fighter practice (which is outdoors) has been slow recently due to cold. The LISTS officer had nothing to report - she reminds fighters to check the expiration date on their Fighter Express Cards. The ARTS & SCIENCES officer is following a request from Kingdom A&S to locate guild charters. It was determined that Storvik had no official guilds, and hence, no charters to worry about. The EXCHEQUER reported that the Drekkr balance was \$372.26 and the Baronial account held \$3,406.04, of which approximately \$1,400 is actually general funds, and the remainder advance money for Twelfth Night. The CHRONICLER said that a combined November/December issue of Drekkr will be out soon. She also announced that her warrant will expire at Twelfth Night, and she is stepping down from the office at that time. Her Deputy, Beornheard of Wearmouth, is interested in taking over the office; any others interested should let her or the Baron & Baroness know. The vacancy will be discussed next meeting. The SENESCHALE is also resigning; since there had not been a chance to notify the Barony-At-Large about the vacancy, it will also be discussed next meeting. Stefan of Cambion, the Deputy Seneschal, is interested in the position.

BARONY MEETINGS: The January meeting will be January 8th, at Kay and Elaina's in Silver Spring. The February meeting was scheduled for February 12th, at Rorik and Janina's in Temple Hills. The March meeting will be March 12th, at Maura von Blitzbau's in Vienna.

PAST EVENTS: The GUY FAWKES event made a small profit. The Exchequer did not yet have the exact amount.

FUTURE EVENTS: The autocrat for the CHRISTMAS BALL was unable to attend, but all is going smoothly. Parents wishing to take advantage of the child care being provided should contact the autocrat in advance. Lord Stefan of Cambion reminded all gentles that there is a DEMO scheduled at EVE-CON for Saturday, Dec. 31, from 10-12. He is looking for fighters, dancers, and material (scrolls, scrapbooks, etc.) for an Arts & Sciences display. Participants will get a one-day free pass for the convention. The autocrat for KINGDOM TWELFTH NIGHT reported that they had a new site, the Severn River School. It has plenty of room and is free. There will be a reimbursement of part of the event fee at the door; they are still re-figuring the budget. More discussion on the event was postponed till later in the meeting. The PERFORMERS REVEL

is set for February 4th, the autocrat urges people to send in their reservations. It was mentioned that His Majesty is actively recruiting fighters, etc. to accompany him to SEA WARS on February 4th (on the southern borders of Atlantia); interested gentles should contact him or see the Acorn for more information. The autocrat for the ST. VALENTINES DAY FEAST & REVEL (Feb. 11) was not present, but the cook, Mistress Signy, reported that a site has been confirmed (Ascension Church). There will be an all-aphrodisiac feast (they're still designing the waivers), dancing, and a court of love. Child care is being planned, at \$1 per hour per child. The ST. PATRICK'S DAY BLOODBATH is scheduled for March 18th; Duke Gyrth is autocrat. The ST. PATRICK'S DAY FEAST, unrelated to but following the Bloodbath, is looking for a site. Mistress Jaelle is the autocrat and Master Igor will cook. The autocrat for FEAST OF FOOLS on April 1 was not present. Mistress Jaelle has mailed her bid to Their Highness for CORONATION on April 8th. She has an agreement with the Ukrainian Church in Silver Spring. The site is wet, and will cost \$1,100. She put down a deposit of \$330, which the Barony will reimburse. Their Highnesses will make a decision by the end of the year; she has mailed an event announcement to the Acorn, but Mistress Moria will wait until the bid is decided to print. May 6th is reserved for the BARONY FAIRE - it will be in Niall and Teleri's backyard. There are no events scheduled so far for June. Novice Tourney is scheduled for July 8th, and will be at Takoma Park Junior High. There was a brief discussion on the possibility of the Barony of Storvik sponsoring a battle or tourney at PENNSIC, but we will have to wait and see how the autocrats are setting up things, and whether Their Majesties will be agreeable. The date the August 26th was reserved for the POST-PENSIC REVEL; an autocrat is needed. Master Niall announced his intention to take an assistant for his position as Provost of the Storvik Collegium, Mistress Jaelle. He then announced that he was resigning as Provost in favor of Mistress Jaelle. She announced that she would like to run the first session of the Collegium on September 23rd, with a variety of classes. There will be one "track" of classes designed for newcomers, and one designed for beginners. Discussion followed; there was concern that any session of the Collegium not scheduled so that it would interfere with the University of Atlantia. Mistress Jaelle will try to find out when and where the fall session of the University will be held, and hold the Collegium either in September or possibly next January. The STORVIK BARONIAL BIRHTDAY event is scheduled for September 16th; Duchess Ysabeau is the autocrat.

NEW BUSINESS: The Chronicler requested that, since the new Kingdom Law requires that no events be scheduled for the same day within 150 miles of each other (without autocrat permission), that the seneschals

of Caer Mear, Tir-Y-Don, Marinus, and Isenfir be added to the complementary subscription list so that those groups will be aware of what Storvik is planning. (Granted) There was some discussion on the number of events any particular gentle was allowed to autocrat in a year - which was determined to be three. It was decided to send a donation of \$76.42 (the exact amount was haggled over at some length) to Bob Levy of the Post for Children's Hospital. Then followed a lengthy discussion on Twelfth Night. A letter from Baroness Elaina was read; it pointed out that first, the people of Storvik were the sponsors of the event and had a real reason to be concerned over how it was being run. Baroness Elaina also reminded the people of Storvik that Mistress Meghan was, as the Autocrat selected by the Crown, the final authority on how the event was run. Suggestions, offers of help, etc. were welcome, but the final decisions on the site, etc. were her responsibility. Mistress Meghan reported that she had had a verbal agreement on the original site, but understood that the community group had priority if they had an event the same date. This was to have been brought up at a community meeting; if the date was ok at that time, then we would have had a written contract. Unfortunately, the date was not brought up at a meeting until late fall, and she did not get formal notification that we no longer had a site until the day she left for the Unevent. Having suspected trouble, she had sent the Acorn two different event announcements (just in case); the Acorn was collated at the Unevent and the announcement mentioning the change of site was thus able to be included. She thanked all the people who had worked hard in trying to locate another suitable site. Mistress Jaelle was commended for locating (with help from the Baron and Baroness of Lochmere) the site now being used, the Severn River School. It was the site of Lochmere's Midsummer Tourney last year. We have the cafeteria, the kitchen, several classrooms, and the teacher's lounge. The site is dry, and does not permit candles. It will close at 9:00, but an early feast was planned anyway. Countess Elizabeth is handling coordinating crash space. Meghan is still looking for help with all aspects of the event.

ATTENDING THE MEETING WERE: Michel le Marin, Rorik Fredericson, Janina Krakowska, Winifred Corbeanoir, Donal Galbraith, Elizabeth Beaufort, Serafina Aquilar, Stephen Haraldson, Elspeth nic Cormac, Brenna of Storvik, Eugene, Maura von Blitzbau, Ealasaid Ramsey of Skye, Malcolm MacMalcolm, Myfanwy of Cambion, Ursula Aelswitha, Signy Dimmridaela, Alyson of Islay, Jaelle of Armida, Teleri Talgellawg, Niall MacKennet, Stefan of Cambion, Andrew MacGregor, Meghan Pengwyn, and Johanna von der Glocken.

NOTES FROM THE JANUARY BARONY MEETING

The January Barony meeting was held January 8, 1989, at the home of the Baron & Baroness Storvik in Silver Spring, Md. As it was determined that the meeting would not begin until the Baroness finished her game of Solitaire, Duke Richard moved that the game be declared WON by the Baroness. Approved by acclamation.

OFFICERS' REPORTS: The HERALD had nothing to report. The MARSHAL had nothing to report as there had been no 'fighting' events since Guy Fawkes. The LISTS officer was not present. The ARTS & SCIENCES officer was 'in a panic', as the information about the A&S competition at Twelfth Night has not yet been delivered to her. The EXCHECQUER reported through the Baroness that the Drekkar balance was \$392.28 and the Baronial account held \$2149.60, of which approximately \$123.10 is actually general funds, and \$2026.28 is Twelfth Night money. A 'thank you' was relayed for the donation to Children's Hospital. The Exchequer would also like to remind people to please return signed check forms. Also, she needs a paper tape adding machine. Anyone willing to donate an adding machine please call. The CHRONICLER's report was "The Drekkar went out. I quit. Talk to Beornheard". The SENESCHALE had nothing to report.

BARONY MEETINGS: The February meeting will be February 12th, at Rorik and Janina's in Temple Hills, not at Maura's. The March meeting will be March 12th, at Vuong Manh's in Hyattsville, MD, and is the 10th anniversary of the Baroness' 1st Barony Meeting. The April meeting will be at Maura's.

PAST EVENTS: An inquiry was made as to the final report of the GUY FAWKES event. It made a small profit, but no figures have yet been submitted. The GRAND CHRISTMAS BALL was very successful, with 104 paid reservations and 99 attending. A profit of aprox. \$100 was made, and a good time was had by all. The Baroness requested that \$30 of the profit be dedicated for purchasing 'milk cartons' to hold the Storvik Cooks Guild equipment. (Approved). The Demo at EVE-CON went well, with demonstrations of Dancing and Fighting.

FUTURE EVENTS: The autocrat for KINGDOM TWELFTH NIGHT, reporting thru Johanna & the Baroness, reported that they are still short of servers. They have aprox. 72 off-board and 260 on-board reservations to date. She expects about 400 total. A discussion was held about the location and logistics of the A&S display. The PERFORMERS REVEL (Feb. 4th), will be held at the same site though the autocrat has been changed. The tourney for the ST. VALENTINES DAY FEAST & REVEL (Feb. 11) has been cancelled, though the Feast & Revel are still on. The ST. PATRICK'S DAY BLOODBATH is scheduled for March 18th; Duke Gyrth is autocrat. The ST. PATRICK'S DAY FEAST has

been cancelled for lack of a site. The autocrat for FEAST OF FOOLS reported that responses to the idea of a Feast of Fools has been lukewarm at best, and that no site has been reserved. He feels that it is likely that the event will be cancelled. Storvik will not host CORONATION, which is to be held in Marinus. No report was made on the BARONY FAIRE. Anyone wishing to file a letter of support should send one to Lady Caroline, Kingdom Seneschal, with a copy to the Baron & Baroness. Letters and words of support of Lord Stefan and Lord Donal were made and filed. Lady Johanna again voiced her resignation, and suggested that her deputy be appointed Chronicler. Beornheard reported that a site for a northern fighting practice has not yet been found, holiday and vacation schedules & Montgomery County having interfered. Some alternatives were suggested.

NEW BUSINESS: There being no new business, the Barony Meeting was adjourned at 9:09 PM. At 9:11, the meeting was re-convened to discuss a new edition of Of Courts & Kings. Discussion ensued; the topic was then tabled until the Feb. meeting. Duchess Ysabeau circulated a 'contact sheet' to be given to new members and asked for commentary. A conspiracy was then hatched to nominate Duchess Ysabeau to the Board. Amid protest, the conspiracy got underway.
