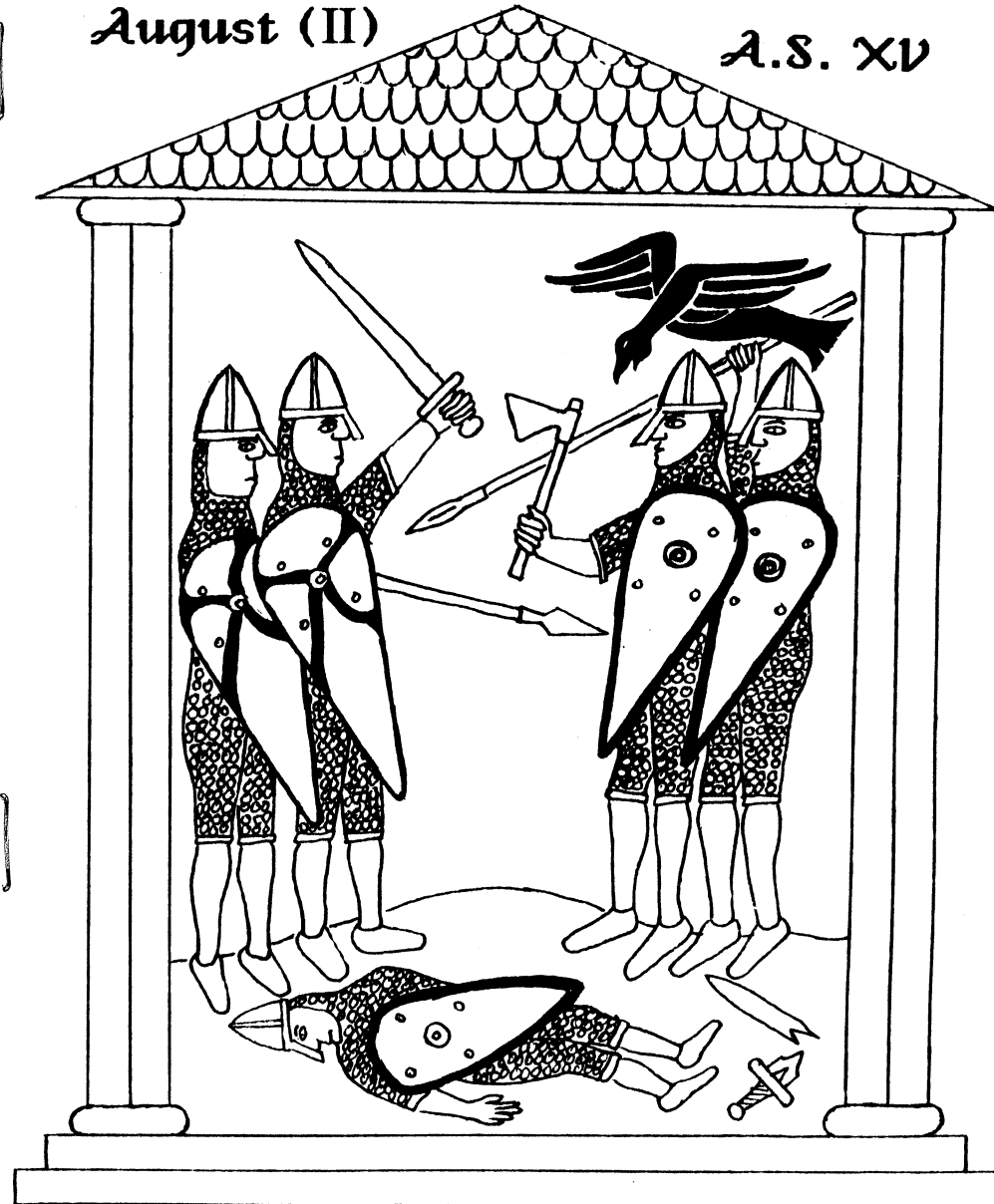

From the Capitol Beltway (I-495): Take New Hampshire Avenue South to Adelphi Road. Go left onto Adelphi. After several miles, you will come to Route 410 (East-West Highway). Get in the right-hand lane, and cross over 410 onto Queens Chapel Road. Go through the light at the top of the hill, and make the next right onto Oliver Street.

From The City: Take North Capitol Street to Michigan Avenue. (Look for the signs to Providence Hospital and the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception). Turn right onto Michigan. It will become Queens Chapel Rd when it leaves the District. Oliver Street is approx. 5.4 miles from the intersection of North Capitol and Michigan. You will eventually pass through a shopping district (a shopping center, gas stations, a Pizza Hut, etc). Queens Chapel Road then goes up a very noticeable hill. Oliver Street is on the other side of the hill, at the bottom, on the left. If you reach Route 410 (East-West Highway), you have gone too far. If so, cross 410, turn around, and follow the "from the Capital Beltway" directions above.

Post-Pennsic Recuperation Revel

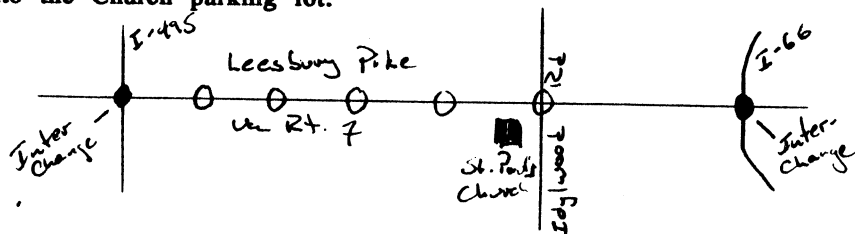

Directions: From points south, east, and west: Take Route 3 North via Route 50 from east and west or Route 301 from the south. Turn right onto Benfield Road (not West Benfield Road). Once on Benfield Road, head east toward Severna Park. The entrance to the church is just past the 3rd light on the right side of the road (about 1-1/2 miles past Jumpers Hole Road).

The second session of the Collegium Storvik will take place on Saturday, September 22, 1990 in Storvik. The location of the event and directions to the site will appear next month.

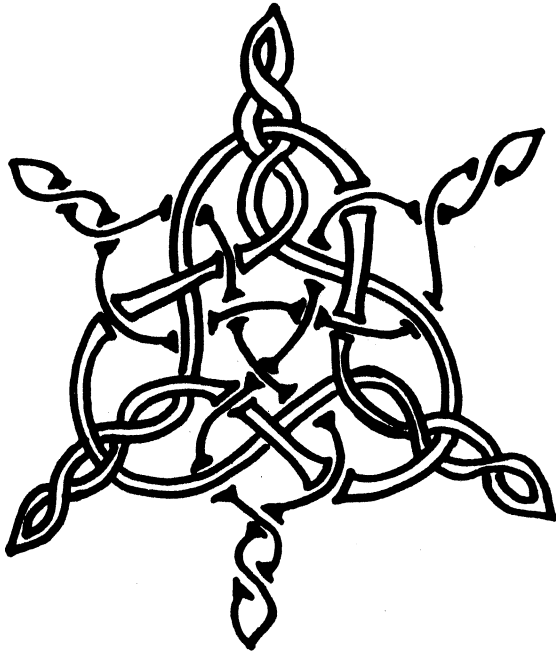

SOME NOTES ON PENNSIC CAMPING

From the University class of Minowara Kiritsubo-sensei, Master Philip of Ghent, and Lady Hilary of Fairhaven.

Being organized

- Make a list. Include:
 - camping equipment
 - kitchen equipment
 - food
 - garb
 - fighting gear
 - medical
 - merchanting/special activities equipment
 - entertainment

-Decide who is responsible for what; minimize duplications.

Selecting a campsite

- Find as level a site as possible.
- Rope off the area, and flag the ropes with light colors [for better night visibility]. Leave walkthroughs between your area and the surrounding camps, as well as between tents.
- If the site is not level, pitch tents so that
 - you sleep with your head uphill
 - they face away from any roads, to minimize dust blowing in.
- Set up tents around a common area, in which the cooking/dining/socializing will be done.
- Clear away all rocks, twigs, & burrs from your tent site, both for comfort and to reduce wear & tear on the tent floor.
- A groundcloth under the tent floor will keep the inside dryer. Pad your tent stakes if they are rough or sharp. Put light-colored flags [teltales] on all guy lines.
- If the weather looks rainy, dig a shallow [3" wide x 3" deep is good] trench around your tent.
- A separate tarp pitched about a foot above the roof of your tent doesn't look period, but keeps the inside cooler; if waterproofed, it can also be extra rain protection. Extend the edges beyond the roof, so that windows can be opened during the rain.

Healthy camping

- Dig a grease pit away from the central area: about 1 foot deep, lined with rocks and covered with twigs if you can, cut the turf away neatly and save it. Mark the pit for easy finding, and for avoidance in the dark before leaving, fill in the pit and replace the cut-away turf.
- Don't keep food too long, and don't use spoiled food. If it looks or smells "off," it probably is; don't try to fix it by cooking it.

Keep food cool

- replenish ice daily
- keep coolers in the shade
- keep food and drinks in separate coolers -- people will be opening the drinks cooler more frequently
- if possible, keep meat in a separate cooler that is only opened for meal preparation.
- Wash all dishes and utensils in hot water. Dump wash and rinse water into the grease pit.
- After washing, rinse dishes, cutting boards, utensils, and tables in a weak solution of vinegar or Clorox [1-2 TBSP per gallon].
- Contain all trash; keep trash bags closed.

Safety

- Be careful with open flames, including tiki torches. Fire pits are OK, but consider traffic patterns.

Camp comfort and maintenance

- Make everyone [this includes fighters] keep their gear out of the way.
- A separate, small tent for fighting gear is good if you have it; but watch out for condensation that can rust steel pieces.
- Police the camp once or twice daily -- put away belongings, throw away trash.

Consider insect repellants

- citronella candles are less obviously modern, but require open flames
- Yard Guard is less period, but very effective.
- mosquito coils can be put into tents for a while before going to bed.

Heat

- Keep heads covered, especially with sun-hats, headrails, mantling, veils. Light colors are the most effective.

- Consider taking a small cooler full of cold, wet cloths to the battlefield for fighters to wipe down their heads & faces.

Food

- Serve cool, easy, comfortable foods. Lots of fresh fruit is good, and can be bought on site.
- Keep lots of cool drinks on hand -- cold herb teas, lemon water, sekanjabin, plain water are all good. BEER AND COFFEE ARE NOT-they are too dehydrating.
- People will eat less than they expect, but make sure that everyone eats regularly -- especially fighters before a battle.
- Plan on using 2 - 2 1/2 gallons of water per person per day, for all uses [drinking, cooking, washing]
- In most years, the Coopers Lake water is safe to drink; last year, because of the drought, contaminant levels were unusually high and a number of people got sick. If you have delicate stomachs in your camp, consider bringing bottled drinking water; or freeze water in well-cleaned gallon milk bottles and use it as ice until it melts.

Food preparation

- Set up a schedule in advance for meal preparation and cleanup.
- Consider
- times of arrival
 - times of fighting and other activities of interest

Tips

- the cook for a meal doesn't clean up [consider couples here too, as they often help each other]
- if there are more meals than cooks, lunch is the prime candidate for doubling up, since it's usually the easiest
- If costs are an issue for some people, consider letting the cook for each meal be responsible for buying the food -- costs can be matched to budgets.

Equipment

- See back issues of *TI*, the *Acorn* and *Drekkr* for lists of equipment. Also see following article.

Consider bringing:

- a shovel or entrenching tool, for drainage trenches
- extra plastic bags
- string bags for carrying ice

PENNSIC CAMPING CHECKLIST

(Courtesy of House Dragon's End)

This is the bare minimum you should have for a week at Pennsic. You can do with less, but it isn't easy.

MONEY:

- \$20 - Gas (this will vary - check with your ride)
- \$50 - Food and ice (more or less) also variable - it's cheaper to go in with a group and share cooking chores, too.
- \$20-\$60 - site fees and tolls
- \$10 (or as much as you want to spend) for on-site expenses and the merchants. You will probably be able to spend anything you bring - and many merchants will take plastic, too.

CLOTHING:

The weather at Pennsic can vary from hot, sticky days of over 90 degrees in the shade (of which there is very little), to very chilly nights. Thunderstorms, with heavy, drenching rains and strong winds are common. So is mud. All this should be borne in mind when planning what to wear - if you come prepared for everything, you should do alright.

-- Daytime garb - should be lightweight, preferably of cotton. Bring all you can get made - **YOU WILL WEAR IT!** It should also be **WASHABLE**.

-- Nighttime garb - Bring what you'd wear to a winter event - Pennsic nights can be very cold. Garb that can be worn in layers is highly recommended.

-- A warm cloak

-- Sturdy shoes - Roads are either dirt (mud) or gravel; you may find thin-soled shoes insufficient for comfort on rough gravel.

-- Sandals/flip-flops (for the shower and when shoes are too hot. Wooden clogs are period, and will keep your hem out of the muddy roads).

-- Boots (preferably waterproofed) For fighters, sturdy boots are a **MUST**, to protect your feet.

-- Socks - for inside your boots and sturdy shoes

-- Underwear - as you see fit. (Underdresses/chemises and shirts of light cotton are strongly suggested - they will help keep your outer garb inhabitable longer.

-- . Swimsuits (or chemises for that purpose. Bear in mind that, while the swimming hole is traditionally nudist, many are the comments about beached whales).

-- Shorts (for under your short tunics - very handy!)

-- A Hat or other headgear - straw hats are very common. Veils also help to keep the sun off your neck.

-- A full set of mundanes for the occasional trip to town. You also might want to keep a clean set in your car, for the trip home.

PERSONAL STUFF:

-- Toothbrush and toothpaste

-- Soap, shampoo, cream rinse

-- Brush & comb

-- Deodorant

-- Towel (two, and a washcloth, is even better)

-- Prescription Medicines (If you have been prescribed something by the doctor, **TAKE IT**, and let someone in camp know if you need reminding. **AND IF YOU ARE ALLERGIC TO BEE OR INSECT STINGS**, bring your kit and let people know how to help you if you get stung.

-- Toilet paper (just in case)

-- A First Aid kit - The Chirurgeons have emergency supplies, but simple things like bandaids, medicated ointment or iodine, aspirin, etc. you should bring yourself.

-- Suntan/sunscreen lotion: SPF 2,4,6,8,15,26,17,30 - If you are fair-skinned, or burn easily, this is a **MUST**. Hawaiian Tropic makes the 22 and 27 grades, which really work and are worth the price for sun-sensitive people.

-- Lipscreen - sunscreen for the lips, but doesn't taste like it.

-- Aloe Vera gel or other lotion for sunburn. (Solarcane and Noxema may make you peel a lot worse than normal.) It really is important to use some kind of moisturizing lotion to keep the skin from drying out, **WHETHER YOU'VE BURNED OR NOT!**

-- Bug repellant of some kind - the principal ingredient should be NN diethyl-meta-toumamide - the more, the better. At least 35% - 95% is best. The bugs at Pennsic are so big you can see the FAA registration numbers on their sides, so come prepared.

BEDDING:

-- Sleeping bag or 2 blankets and sheets, etc.

-- Extra Blankets (for those cold nights...)

-- Pillow

- Air mattress or ensoilte pad (optional)
- Cot (optional)

CAMPING EQUIPMENT:

- A tent (or arrange to share space in one)
- A plastic ground cloth (for under the tent)
- A flashlight (and bring fresh batteries)
- Feast Gear (or enough disposables for the duration).
- Something to store food in - a cooler, cardboard boxes, etc., or shared space in such).
- Something to cook your food in, or to share use of such - remember that most cooking will be done over a campfire or maybe a campstove.
- Water jug - at least one, more if you have them)
- Basic Kitchen Gear - can-opener, knives, cutting board, potholders, dishwashing stuff, long-handled spoons or forks, grills for the campfire, bowls to mix in, - check with the group you're camping with.

THINGS TO DO:

- Needlework, medieval games, spinning... things to do when you're bored or it's raining AGAIN.
- Musical instruments - there will be a lot of people to jam with, but do remember what kind of weather you will exposing your recorder, harp, guitar, etc. to.
- Armor and weapons (This is a war, after all.)

OTHER USEFUL CAMPING STUFF:

- A fire extinguisher - highly recommended.
- Dining Fly or Tarp, with poles and pegs, etc.
- Water coolers
- Lawn furniture
- Patio Torches on stable poles
- Dishpans
- Sturdy, collapsable tables
- A pocket knife or good belt knife.
- 50' rope - an infinitely handy item.
- Monsoon Kit - Extra sets of mundanes, waterproofed footwear, two or three pairs of dry socks, and extra bedding, to keep in your vehicle. (We're really not kidding about the rain...)

FOOD:

A whole separate article could be on food. Remember that this is a camping environment. Food spoils easily in the Pennsic heat, and coolers don't work as well as you think. Plan on frequent food runs. There is a produce stand on site that sells ice, soda, and groceries - prices are a bit high, but it's convenient. There are grocery stores within a reasonable drive, for meat and other grocery items. There are also the inns, and any number of young gentles wandering the campsite selling pepperoni rolls and other such edibles.

What you plan for food really depends on how much work you want to put into it. Do pack soup type foods and canned meal things in case of monsoon weather. Dried food, such as pasta, rice, barley, etc. keep well and need nothing more than boiling water to cook. Oatmeal and other cooked cereals (instant or otherwise) are period, and can taste real good on a chilly morning. A small hibachi and some charcoal can be real useful. Soups or stews can be prepared ahead of time, frozen solid, and will not only keep for a short while in the cooler, but provide a solid block of ice to help keep other things cool. There are hard salamis that do not require much in the way of refrigeration, and also require no cooking on those hot Pennsic afternoons. Bring whatever spices and seasonings as you would use at home normally, and whatever utensils you think you'll need. Meals can really be as simple or as complicated as you like - check with the people you are camping with and plan ahead.

Notes from the
VIRGINIA DESTINY MEETING II

By Duchess Ysabeau Cameron of Lochiel

Virginian Storviki held a second meeting to discuss options for organizing, on Friday July 6 at the home of Earl Laeghaire & Duchess Ysabeau. Approximately 35 Virginians were present, as well as Their Excellencies Kay & Elaina, and our seneschal Lord Stefan of Cambion. As summary of conclusions on various topics follows.

Type of Group. The sense of the first meeting and subsequent mailing was that the first step should be to Shire, with Barony a goal in the unspecified future. After considering the logistics [including paperwork], the sense of this second meeting was that Barony should be a short-term [6-18 months] goal. It may prove most convenient to organize first as a Canton of Storvik, or it may be preferable to move directly to Barony.

Subsidiary Divisions. Since Virginian Storvik has about 4 times the minimum member population for a Barony, it could conceivably support several Cantons. The sense of the meeting was that subdivisions are a matter of group identity, and that at present the only strong group identification is with Virginian Storvik as a whole.

Name. The responses to the mailing suggested several dozen possible names, and a number of additional themes or concepts that could be worked into names. No clear favorite has emerged so far.

Officers. The Kingdom Seneschal had pointed out that groups do not elect their own officers, but simply present candidate[s] to the Kingdom Officers, who make the final decision. She recommended that where more than one person has volunteered or been nominated, the individuals try to work out a resolution among themselves. The meeting agreed that where this does not prove possible, an Australian balloting system might be a workable approach to rank-order the candidates for presentation to the Kingdom officers. Such a ballot might also be used for Baron/Baroness candidates.

Committee. The meeting agreed that so large a group was too unwieldy to make the many decisions ahead of us. Five gentles were

selected by acclamation to form a steering committee: Lady Winifred Corbet de Wynterwood [seneschal candidate], Lady Aislinn die Bogenschutzein [exchequer candidate], Mistress Meghan Pengwyn of Wynterwood [chronicler candidate], Sir Strykar Geirhaldsson [voice of reason], and Earl Laeghaire O'Laverty [organizer of previous meetings].

The committee is charged with

- talking with the Maryland cantons to find out what approaches have worked best for them
- talking to the Baronial officers about transition issues
- reviewing ideas & suggestions [for name, device, etc.] & making recommendations to the group at large
- negotiating any division of Baronial assets
- devising a transition plan & schedule
- considering how best to identify potential officers and Baron/ess
- assisting Lord Stefan in operating any formal polings

The committee's first meeting will be held on Wednesday, July 18 at the home of Lady Winifred & Mistress Meghan. The committee's mail contact is Earl Laeghaire [Bob Charrette, 7875 Wintercress Lane, Springfield, VA 22152]

Sir Thomas Wyatt and Pre-Elizabethan Poetry

Sir Thomas Wyatt the Elder (1503-1542) was a statesman and diplomat from the court of Henry VIII of England. While essentially a medieval man by training, he possessed the intellectual curiosity of the Renaissance. He traveled extensively in Italy, France and Spain and came into contact with some of the great poets of the age.

England in the first decades of the 1500's was largely barren of fine literature. The devastated period of the War of the Roses, followed by Henry VII's prosperous, but practical, reign, added almost nothing of note to the written arts. This void was filled when Wyatt brought back from his travels many new forms of poetic expression which Henry VIII's court avidly adapted for use in the English language. By far the best known of these was the sonnet. This verse form would develop into the favorite of the next generation's greatest poets, most notably Shakespeare and Spenser. But Wyatt also introduced other forms which would reach lesser heights of popularity, but which would still take their place in English literature. Most of Wyatt's work and that of his contemporaries was restricted to the private circulation of poems among friends at court. It was not until 1557 that a public collection was printed. This influential collection is now known as Tottel's Miscellany; it contains most of the major works of Wyatt and the ill-fated Henry Howard, Earl of Surrey.

Two of the Italian verse forms introduced by Wyatt are the *ottava rima* and *terza rima*.

The *ottava rima* is an eight line stanza which rhymes abababcc and is in iambic pentameter. It may be used as either a single stanza poem, as in Wyatt's In Spain, or as multiple stanzas of a larger work such as They Flee From Me.

The *terza rima* is a variable length poem which rhymes aba bcb cdc, etc, and concludes with a rhyming couplet. It is also in the classic iambic pentameter. It requires a minimum of about nine lines before the pattern becomes apparent. Each three lines is called a tercet. The *terza rima* was the verse form used by Dante to write his Divine Comedy. Wyatt used it for one of his finest poems, My own John Poins.

Unlike the sonnet, many of these poems use subject matter other than that of love, although the majority fall into that category. In Spain expresses Wyatt's longing to return to his native country; My Own John Poins is a poetic letter to a friend on the joys of life in the country far away from the court.

Even if Wyatt's poetry never attained the elegance of his models or the excellence of his successors, nonetheless his work still ranks well. And even were this not so, English literature still owes him a profound debt for bringing a new life to English poetry.

In Spain (1539)

Tagus, Farewell, that westward with thy streams
Turns up the grains of gold already tried;
With spur and sail for I go seek the Thames
Gain the sun, that showeth her wealthy pride;
And to the town which Brutus sought by dreams,
Like bended moon doth lend her lusty side,
My king, my country, alone for whom I live --
Of mighty love for wings for this me give!
